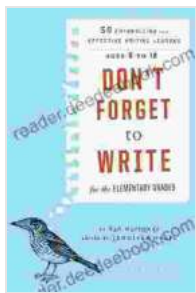


Don't Forget to Write for the Elementary Grades

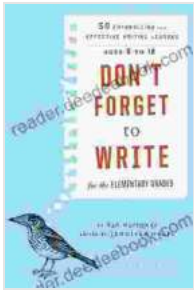
